Course Goals and Description

The goals of this course of *halacha* include:

- A clear knowledge of the *halacha* in areas relevant to young women in the 21st century.
- A working familiarity with halachic terms enabling students to discuss *halachic* issues and ask a *shayla* of rabbis and *poskim* when necessary.

The course will include lecture material, class discussion, readings and worksheets at home as well as projects. Students will also be asked to work in *chavrusa* pairs to prepare or review material.

Required Supplies

- Each student is required to maintain a loose-leaf binder for all handouts and notes relevant to this course. This notebook should serve as an excellent *halacha* resource for many years to come, beyond the time spent in this class. As such, students may find that a separate loose leaf dedicated to this class would be beneficial. Alternatively, students may opt to include Halacha

in a larger notebook with other subjects. A spiral notebook will be very difficult to use in this class and should be avoided.

- You will need four dividers for the four separate areas of *halacha* that, G-d willing, will be covered this year.

Grading Policies

If a student is absent it is her responsibility to speak with me and arrange to make-up any work missed.

Students should be prepared for notebook checks which may be unannounced. Mini-quizzes will often be given at the start or at the end of the period. Tests will be given two to three times a semester. Projects will be graded as two test grades. A cumulative final will be given at the end of each semester.
